The "Why in 5" campaign for Social Justice is a way for NYSUT members to use a short set of talking points to educate others about significant Social Justice issues. It is for members to use in line at the grocery store checkout, at holiday time while attending a family dinner, or in the stands at a sporting event.

With today's political landscape, it is more important than ever that our members are educated about key issues and can help us educate the members of the communities they serve so that we can continue to improve the living and working conditions both locally and nationally. Each "business size" card has 5 key points listed on the back challenging us to "Be the Union" for:
